The **Onslow Bay 37 Tournament Edition**, filling the gap between the 33 and 41 models, features a ventilated step hull with 7-degree reverse chines for a stable, fuel-efficient ride that tops out to over 70 mph with triple Mercury Verado 400s. The redesigned hardtop, console-front lounge, berth. sink, and head inside the console are all standard. Options include forward seating, air conditioning, and a Seakeeper. Six insulated, macerated fish boxes total 2,400 quarts. There's a standard 68-gallon rear livewell and an option for a 73-gallon leaning-post livewell. Three helm choices include a cooler space, a tackle center, or a leaningpost/livewell bench-seat combination.

- JAMES COWART MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP honors 1981 Swansboro High School graduate and local pharmacist. In addition to working at many pharmacies in North Carolina and Florida, he launched his own home infusion pharmacy.
- MICHAEL DAVIS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP honors the son of Swansboro Rotary Club charter member, Bud Davis.
- NELL HANCOCK MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP honors the wife of Rotarian Nat Hancock, a charter member of the club and a member until his death.
- KEN CHASE MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP honors long-time member and past president of the Swansboro Rotary Club. An active leader among Rotarians, Ken was especially proud of achieving 22 years of perfect attendance within the Rotary. His passion and dedication to the club and his community were unmatched.
- LEROY "DOC" HENDERSON MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP honors a past president of the Swansboro Rotary Club and founding president of Coastal Carolina Community College.

Rotary Awards Scholarships

In their 46th year of giving, the Swansboro Rotary Club awarded a total of \$40,000 in scholarships to ten graduating seniors from Croatan and Swansboro high schools during their Annual Scholarship Awards Banquet on May 15, 2025. Each recipient received a scholarship valued at \$4,000.

The scholarship program began in 1979 with a single scholarship of \$1,000. By 2019, the total amount awarded through the Swansboro Rotary Scholarship Program had exceeded \$1 million. As of now, this amount has increased to nearly \$1.3 million, totaling \$1,292,000.

To be eligible for the Swansboro Rotary scholarship, applicants must meet certain criteria, including strong academic performance, participation in athletics, and demonstrated financial need. Recipients typically rank highly in their classes, engage in extracurricular activities, and actively participate in volunteer work within the community.

Each scholarship is named in honor of a Rotarian, family member, or friend of the Rotary Club, commemorating their memory and service to the community. The luncheon celebrates the students, their families, teachers, administrators, counselors, and the families and friends of the individuals for whom the scholarships are named.

Special thanks were given to Mrs. Nicole Rains, counselor at Swansboro High School, and Mr. Mark James, counselor at Croatan High School. They served as the Club's primary contacts for the high schools, assisting in the solicitation and screening of scholarship applicants by providing completed applications, letters of recommendation, and transcripts.

Helen Gross, chair of the Scholarship Committee, and Chuck Douglas, president of the Swansboro Rotary Club, announced the 2025 scholarship recipients from Croatan and Swansboro high schools to the audience.







ROTARIAN OF THE YEAR

he Swansboro Rotary Club is proud to recognize Ken Banks as the **Swansboro Rotarian of** the Year, honoring more than a decade of service, leadership, and unwavering dedication to the ideals of Rotary.

Ken joined the Swansboro Rotary Club in 2013 and quickly became a cornerstone of the organization.

Professionally, he is the founder of Banks, Gray, Crumpler, PLLC, CPAs, a firm he built from a solo practice into a thriving partnership that now includes his daughter, Natalie Crumpler, as one of two partners. Today, his firm maintains offices in both Goldsboro and Emerald Isle, reflecting Ken's deep roots in North Carolina and his commitment to serving clients across the region.

His entrepreneurial spirit and financial expertise have also been instrumental to the Club's success. Behind the scenes, Ken provides all of the Club's accounting support -

managing invoicing, tax returns, and financial statements – ensuring fiscal responsibility and transparency year after year.

A sustaining member of Rotary, Ken is also a tireless participant in the life of the Club. He rarely misses a weekly meeting, supports community service projects, and contributes his talents wherever needed. His steady presence and servant leadership embody the Rotary motto of "Service Above Self."

Originally from Goldsboro, NC, Ken now lives on the water in Newport with his wife, Sharon, to whom he has been married since 1995. Together, they are active members of Emerald Isle Baptist Church, where Ken has served as Chair of the Ministry Council and is currently serving on the search committee for a new minister.

His faith also guides his professional and personal life through his 13-year membership in C12, the nation's leading Peer

Advisory Forum for Christian CEOs and business owners. Remarkably, Ken has never missed a single C12 meeting – a testament to his discipline and devotion.

Outside of work and service, Ken embraces life with the same passion and joy. A dedicated golfer, he plays two to three times a week, earning the nickname "Silk" from his golf buddies for his smooth-assilk swing.

He and Sharon also share a love of dancing – whether line dancing or shagging to beach music, they're known to light up the dance floor.

Ken's recognition as **Swansboro Rotarian of the Year** reflects not only his professional and personal achievements but also his heart for service, fellowship, and community. His contributions have strengthened the Swansboro Rotary Club and left a lasting impact on our community.

Club Focus Is Service

Rotary International is the world's first service club. It was founded in February 1905 when lawyer Paul Harris and three friends met in a small office in downtown Chicago.

These men wanted to rekindle the spirit of friendliness that they enjoyed in their hometowns. They began a routine of meeting for lunch once a week. As word of the meetings spread, their number grew and they began to rotate the meeting from place to place, thus the name, "Rotary." By the end of 1905, the Rotary Club of Chicago had 30 members.

Though founded based on a desire for fellowship, the club found ways to use the talent and resources of its members to serve the community. Within five years, the National Association of Rotary Clubs was formed with 16 member clubs. Two years later, in 1912, the association became international with the formation of a club in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada.

Today, Rotary is an organization of business and professional leaders united worldwide who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations and help build goodwill and peace in the world. One of the organization's major service projects is an effort to eradicate polio worldwide. Members also support exchange programs for students and business peoplethat promote understanding among all the world's people.

Swansboro Rotary Club was founded in 1978 with 23 members, several of whom are still active in the club. Over the years, Swansboro Rotary has grown substantially.



Currently, there are 62 members in the club, which boasts numerous District- and National-level Rotary awards as well as a past district governors John Eller and April Clark, and past assistant district governor, David Pearson.

The annual Fishing Tournament Series – consisting of the Memorial Day Bluewater Tournament held in May and the Swansboro Five-O King Mackerel Tournament held in October - is the largest fundraiser the club spon-



Of all the events, perhaps the club's most visible project is the club's scholarship program. This year, Swansboro Rotary awarded tten \$4,000 scholarships to graduating seniors from Croatan and Swansboro high schools. We have also added four \$500 Excellence in Teaching Awards to area teachers. Since the program's inception in 1979, the club has provided nearly \$1.3 million in college scholarships to 441 students from Swansboro and Coatan high schools.

pril Clark, past governor for Rotary District 7730, has been awarded Rotary International's highest honor, the Service Above Self Award.

Crooks recommended Clark for the award.

Clark's passion for the protection of coastal resources has led to the district's prioritizing of the environment and clean water. In 2020-21, she served as the adviser to establish the district's

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Task Force.


Clark currently serves as a Leadership Dialogue facilitator, working to create a dialogue of peace and conflict resolution around the country.





Swansboro Rotary Club sponsors a variety of fundraisers each year. In addition, the club works on projects when called upon in order to benefit the community and beyond.

Fishing Tournament Series

Serious prize money helps make the annual Memorial Day Bluewater and Swansboro Five-O King Mackerel tournaments a huge success. This is the largest and most profitable of the club's fundraisers. The Bluewater Tournament kicks off the series over Memorial Day weekend and the King Mackerel Tournament is held in October.

NCLEAP 50/50 TWT

During the club's fishing tournaments, anglers can participate in a special TWT supporting the North Carolina Law Enforcement Assistance Program. NCLEAP is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. Their services are offered at no charge to the men and women who serve as law enforcement officers, firefighters,

and emergency service personnel. Funding comes through donations of individuals and generous community organizations like the Rotary. Since 2020, the club has helped NCLEAP put over 1,000 first responders through post-critical incident seminars with over \$337,500 in total support!

Scholarship Program From its first \$1000 scholarship to

its current level of \$4000 scholarships, the club has awarded nearly \$1.3 million to over 441 graduating seniors from Croatan and Swansboro high schools. Beginning in 2000, the club approved an annual scholarship budget of \$24,000 and authorized eight fouryear scholarships at \$3000 each. This budget increase paved the way for our current level of 10 four-year scholarship awards of \$4,000 each. Even in the face of a difficult economy, this club has steadfastly maintained this level of scholarship commitment.

Excellence in Teaching Awards

Since 2022, the Swansboro Rotary Club has awarded four local teachers with Excellence in Teaching awards at their annual scholarship luncheons. The \$500 awards are given to teachers who demonstrate an unparalleled ability to educate and make a difference in the lives of their students. The awards identify, recognize, and promote excellence in classroom teaching in Swansboro area schools.

Oyster Roast & Pig Out

This much anticipated March event feeds and entertains well over 1000 fun-seeking, hungry folks. In addition to oysters, this all-you-can-eat extravaganza offers roasted pig, fried fish, clam chowder, hot dogs, and all the trimmings, as well as live entertainment and six big screen TV's to watch the NCAA Basketball tournament. Monies raised from this event help fund the scholarship program.

BackPack Friends

One of our newest projects, we provide financial assistance and supplies to BackPack Friends to provide nutritional meals and snacks to children who may need a little extra nourishment over the weekend. This year we helped fund a successful Duck Race to raise funds for the program.

Caring for Kids

For this project, club members, family and friends take needy children Christmas shopping for a day. This year, the club budgeted \$6000, allowing it to host 30 children for shopping fun. Community friends and hosts also provided additional funding for this project.

Adam's Closet

This project was developed to address the need for clothing for children in 25 nearby schools. The Swansboro Rotary Club is committed to raising \$25,000 this year to provide outerwear and shoes for children in need. Additionally, the program has attracted private donations totaling \$15,000 so far this year.
















Budda Howard

Budda also served on the Military Affairs Committee for


Camp Lejeune, a role through which he lent his expertise and care to a cornerstone of our military community. His involvement reflected a heart ready to serve those who served us.

Known for his warm laughter and genuine charm, Budda loved attending Carolina Panthers football games. This simple joy grounded him among friends and family.





ADAM'S CL

Rotary Funds Student Needs

t's been nine years since the Swansboro Rotary Club launched Adam's Closet, a project that provides funding to area schools, ensuring students get the clothing they need.

Few, if any, club members realized that when Brandon Staton invited a couple of school counselors to speak at a Rotary meeting, they'd be opening the door to Adam's Closet. But that's what happened.

The project is close to the heart of its namesake, Adam Barefield. Born with congenital heart disease, the son of David Barefield of Emerald Isle, a longtime member of Swansboro Rotary Club, and Linda Styron of Morehead City, Adam underwent open-heart surgery at 7-months old. By the time of his death, at age 18 in 2003, while awaiting a heart transplant, young Adam proved to not only be altruistic, but selfless in his actions.

"I can easily tell all of you that Adam would love the idea of this project and helping those less fortunate children," his father said. "He would be so happy to be part of such a good thing."

According to his mother, Adam was steadfast in his efforts to raise money for the American Heart Association and research heart disease.

In promoting American Heart Month in February 1995, the 9-year-old had the

privilege of having his photo taken with then Govenor Jim Hunt. "It was quite an honor," Styron said. "But Adam would not leave before getting a \$5 donation from the governor."

"He loved fundraising," Barefield said. "He had a big heart. He was a kid who wanted to raise money to help others."

As a student, Adam regularly participated and excelled in raising AHA funds during the "Jump Rope for Heart" events.

"He took great pride in learning all about heart disease during his last few years," Barefield said." However, it was obvious to us that he was also attracted to how caring these professionals were. He



developed a special bond with many of them as they did with him."

Impressed with the profession, Adam told his family that he hoped to become a heart specialist someday.

For Barefield and Styron, even 20 years after his death, talking about Adam can still be emotional. Similarly, the club's decision to name its most recent charitable effort after Adam has especially touched his parents.

For that, they have Rotarian Greg Maready to thank.

Staton said the seed for this project started when he invited Danielle Merrell and Laurie Jackson, counselors from White Oak Elementary School, to speak to the club in October 2016. The company he worked for had a special relationship with the school and he wanted the counselors to share their school experiences with the club.

"That's how we discovered what the children needed," Barefield said. Club members learned that students from kindergarten-through-fifth-grade needed clothing - everything from coats to socks.

"The teachers and counselors were spending their own money, doing what they had to do to ensure the children at their school did not go without," Barefield added.

Staton said the presentation impressed the club membership, providing insight into how much need there is right here. "You'd be hard-pressed to find anyone who doesn't think that teachers are underpaid," Staton continued. "Yet, they always go the extra mile for their students."

When the counselors finished talking, it was Barefield who spoke next, according to Staton.

"David stood up and said, 'Here's \$20.' By the time they left, we'd collected \$564," he said.

The needs of the school children must have weighed heavily on the hearts of the club members because at the next Rotary board meeting Staton said a suggestion was made to create a project to assist students who needed articles of clothing.

Club member Garland Sewell recommended a 10-year commitment (at least to begin with) providing between \$3,500 and \$6,000 per year, which was enough to pay for up to 100 coats and 100 pairs of shoes each year.

"They knew it would be a good project," Barefield said.

It was at that point that Maready suggested they call the project "Adam's Closet," according to Staton.

Though there won't be an actual closet, the club hopes to develop relationships with retailers so that when a school official identifies a child in need of a specific item of clothing, there will be funds available to purchase that item. The fund and the relationship with the retailer will be a "virtual" closet.

In 2016, the club began funding two schools - White Oak Elementary and Swansboro Elementary, according to Staton. He called the initial effort a "pilot program."

"It allowed us to study the impact," he said. "We wanted to start with the two schools to iron out any inefficiencies."

Lisa Peele, principal of Swansboro Elementary at the time, said the program was a great thing at her school.

"It was an awesome partnership that we have with them," she said of the Rotarians. "I was excited to be part of the program."

Peele, who had been at the school for 10 years, said that annually, between 150 to 200 students – out of a student population of about 600 - needed clothing.

For Terri Brett, principal at White Oak Elementary School at the time, the assistance did more than fill a need; it also brought to light the role schools play in the lives of young people.

"They (Rotarians) know that the schools try to be problem solvers ... to do things that can have a positive impact," she said. "They want to help ... and that is very gratifying."

Since its inception in 2016, the program has gained serious momentum. "What began with 2 local schools has now expanded to 25 schools evenly spread between Onslow, Jones, and Carteret counties," according to Barefield.

"The Rotary Club's annual budget now allots \$25,000 for Adam's Closet, distrib-

uted evenly between the 25 schools, and it can be modified as needed," Barefield said.

Adam's Closet is working wonders for those students in need of decent clothing. Before the program, teachers were trying to fund the clothing needs of their students out of their own pockets.

"They couldn't just sit by and watch the children suffer and be humiliated because of their clothing," Barefield added.

In February 2022, Cathy Tomon, principal at Bridges School in Morehead City, recounted the time she noticed that one student was wearing the same clothes for a week. He told her he had nothing else to

"When I asked him to take off his shoe to see his size, he only had half a sock on. He didn't even have underwear!" she said. "With the funds you provided, we were able to purchase 3 pairs of pants, 2 sweatshirts, 2 pairs of shoes, underwear, socks, and a belt for this child."

Swansboro Elementary provided 81 items of clothing and 12 pairs of nice tennis shoes this winter for their students.

In 2020, Swansboro Middle School counselor Kevin Dick emailed the club, "For February, because of your generosity, we were able to obtain 4 boys jackets, 3 girls coats, 12 pairs of gloves, and 10 hats. The students were very appreciative of the warm wear."

"Adam's Closet provides a muchneeded source of funding for local students in our community, and there are no administrative fees," according to Barefield. "One hundred percent of everything we collect goes to the schools," he said. "There is no gray area." The club also absorbs the cost of annual tax filing, according to Barefield.

White Lightning Sets A Prize Money Record

The 44th Annual Swansboro Rotary Five-O King Mackerel Tournament began on Tuesday, October 15, with a fantastic Captain's Party at the beautiful Farm 58 Wedding & Event Venue in Swansboro. This event marked the beginning of exciting fishing from Thursday, October 17, leading up to an incredible Awards Party on Saturday, followed by a free concert featuring the talented Spare Change Band hosted by Saltwater Grill..



ake Forest-based boat White **Lightning** captured the 44th annual Swansboro Rotary Five-O King Mackerel Tournament on Saturday, Oct. 19, 2024.

The Tim Hudson-captained boat weighed a 45.06-pounder on day one of the three-day competition to win \$144,452, the biggest payout in tournament history.

Less than a half-pound is all that separated White Lightning from the next boat, *Release*. The Clayton boat captained by Mike Williams just missed the mark with a 44.61-pound fish. The two-fish aggregate race was even closer, with White Lightning's catches weighing a combined 77.92 pounds to Release's 77.89 pounds.

Release went home with \$35,398 in prize money.

White Lightning was entered into just about every category, including the NCLEAP 50/50 Aggregate division that raises money to provide services for law enforcement officers,

firefighters, and emergency service personnel. The boat was also entered in the brand-new Elite 10 Aggregate Winner Take All division, which saw six sign ups this year.

She Said Yes Again out of Elon rounded out the podium with a thirdplace fish weighing 39.31 pounds and winning the boat \$15,338 in prize money.

Double Down won \$6,000 for fourth place with a 34.63-pound fish, Slick Finish won \$5,000 for fifth place with a 33.5-pounder and Windy Conditions won \$3,500 for sixth place with a 29.3pounder.

Wendy Tillett of **Windy Conditions** won the Lady Angler award with her 29.3-pound catch, Kaylee Mitchell of **Pipesplus** was the Junior Angler winner with a 12.62-pounder, and Hudson took home the Senior Angler honors.

Gone Again placed second in the two-fish aggregate division with 56.81 combined pounds, while Windy **Conditions** placed third with 56.05.

Windy Conditions was last year's overall winner and recipient of \$139,668 in prize money for a 59.85pound king mackerel.

Five teams won \$1000 each in the \$5000 Out of the Money Prize category. Five teams from 11th to last place weighed get placed in a random drawing. Winners in this year's prize drawing were **Animal House**, **Full** Coverage, Reel Moore, Money Grows On Trees, and Ali-Kat.

The tournament, which is named the Five-O because it limits the field of boats to 50, only saw two king mackerel weighing 40 pounds or more come in to the weigh station. There were 25 fish brought to the downtown scales at the Church Street Dock. Salt Water Grill hosted the awards ceremony on Saturday.

The money raised by the Rotary Club from the tournament goes to a variety of community-enriching charities.

Between the Swansboro Rotary Bluewater Memorial Day Tournament and the Five-O, \$270,000 has been donated to NCLEAP and almost \$1.3 million in scholarships have been awarded to students from Croatan and Swansboro high schools.



"Release" went home with \$35,398 in prize money after placing second by less than half a pound. 


































2025 swansboro five-O rules & regulations

The rules set forth by the Tournament Committee in no way modify or abridge State and Federal fishing Regulations. It is the responsibility of each Captain to know and adhere to these Regulations.

- 1. Deadline for Entries. There will be entries available for a maximum of 50 boats in this King Mackerel Tournament. Registration will open online for the 50 boats that participated in the 2024 Swansboro Five-O on Friday, April 11, 2025 at 11 AM to renew their spot. Registration will open to the public on Friday, May 2, 2025 at 11 AM. Registration will close at such time 50 boats have properly registered. Registrations must be completed in full. Blatant attempts entered with incorrect information to advance entry will not be accepted. Tournament Committee reserves the right to review and deny entry to
- anyone. Once 50 boats have registered, the Tournament will accept a paid entry waiting list. A boat will be added to the waiting list in the order the entry was received. If any of the 50 boats entered drop out before 9 PM on Tuesday, October 14, 2025 the next boat who is properly registered on the waiting list will have the option to become one of the 50 boats. Tournament-Within-A-Tournament (TWT) categories can be entered by the 50 boats until midnight on Wednesday, October 15, 2025 online.
- 2. Each individual spot in the Five-O is owned by the Captain that originally registered for it. Spots are non-transferrable.
- 3. Entry Fees. The entry fee for the King Mackerel Tournament shall be \$1,500 per boat for Level I entry before September 1, 2025. All entry fees are NON-REFUNDABLE. Any

- registrant who has paid to be on the waiting list and who does not advance to be one of the 50 boats will receive a 100% refund within 30 days of October 19, 2025.
- 4. Payment of Entries. At the opening of registration on April 11, 2025 all participants must pay a minimum of \$750 (50% of Level I entry fee) to secure their entry as one of the 50 boats. The \$750 balance of the entry fee must be paid and received by the **Tournament Registration Committee** no later than September 1, 2025. TWT entry fees may be paid at the time of online registration or *from* 6:30 PM to 9 PM on October 14, 2025 at the Captain's Party or online until Midnight, October 15, 2025.
- 5. The Tournament is a Captain's Choice. In the event of "extreme" weather, the Tournament Committee has the right to adjust the schedule or postpone. In the event the

Tournament Committee cancels the Tournament, 85% of the Level I entry fee and 90% of any TWT fees will be refunded within sixty (60) days of the cancellation.

- 6. You must declare your lay day by 8 AM online at www.Swansboro50.com on the day you intend to lay. You will receive confirmation immediately. If you do not receive your notification, text your lay day to 910-290-0919. Be sure to include your boat name and tournament number. Fishing days will be Thursday, October 16, Friday, October 17. and Saturday, October 18, 2025. A team can only fish 2 out of 3 days.
- 7. Fishing Boundaries. No Checkout. No Boundaries. All boats must exit NC inlets and return to NC inlets.
- 8. Official Tournament Channel will be VHF 68 and monitored by

- Tournament Officials for any questions and check-in.
- 9. All King Mackerel Tournament Fish must be weighed-in at Saltwater Grill in Downtown Swansboro, the official weigh-station for the Swansboro Five-O.
- 10. Fishing Times. No lines in the water prior to 8 AM.
- 11. There will be no official ending time for King Mackerel tournament fishing, but boats weighing a fish must be checked in with the Tournament check-in boat no later than 6 PM on Thursday and Friday, and 5 PM on Saturday of the competition. The check-in boat will be stationed at 4 PM at Swansboro check-points near Casper's Marina and Saltwater Grill on the ICW. Scales open at Saltwater Grill for King Mackerel weigh-in at 4 PM each day. Boats failing to meet these deadlines will be EXCLUDED

- from the competition.
- 12. Once a boat has checked-in at the checkpoint, boats must proceed towards the Official Weigh Station at Saltwater Grill in safe, common sense, single-file fashion without land stops.
- 13. All species must be weighed-in from the boat from which they are caught. No trucking or overland transport-ation of fish. Fish must be off-loaded from the boat at designated area ONLY. Any fish not off-loaded from the boat at designated area will be disqualified. ONLY ONE FISH will be eligible for weigh-in and inspection UNLESS the boat is entered in the NCLEAP or Elite 10 Aggregate TWTs.
- 14. Level VIII NCLEAP 50/50 Aggregate and Level IX Elite 10 Aggregate Winner Take All: These levels allow each boat entered to weigh 2 King

Mackerel per declared fishing day, and will be scored by the best 2 out of 4 fish. This is a 2-fish aggregate weight totaled from the best 2 out of 4 King Mackerel for each team entered. A boat may still qualify with a single fish if they do not have

- 15. All fish must be caught by rod and reel.
- 16. Weighed and donated fish become the property of the Swansboro Rotary Club Fishing Tournament.
- 17. **Each boat should be represented** at the Captain's Meeting. Each Captain is responsible for knowing any changes that may be announced at the Captain's Meeting.
- 18. In the event two or more fish are the exact same weight, the fish weighed first shall be declared the winner.
- 19. For safety purposes, all boats entered must adhere to USCG and NC Marine Fisheries regulations for their size.
- 20. A boat MAY be replaced, due to verified mechanical failure, after competition begins, with the Rules Committee's approval, for the next day of competition. Any changes made after registration must be approved by the Tournament Committee.
- 21. *Prizes to be awarded to the boats* with the heaviest fish. In Level I, only one prize per boat will be awarded.
- 22. All checks will be mailed to winners within 14 days following the awards presentation.
- 23. All winners may be subjected to a polygraph examination. The Tournament Committee reserves the right to inspect all boats entered in the competition at any time.
- 24. This is a multiple-day competition, therefore, no King Mackerel shall be on any boat before competition hours begin on any day of competition. Any violation in this rule will result in automatic disqualification for both days of competition.
- 25. Any two or more boats coming together for any reason after a boat begins competition and before weigh-in, may be disqualified. Competition officially begins for a boat once their fishing lines are put in the water. As safety is of primary importance permission may be granted for exceptions by the Committee Boats or Tournament Headquarters.
- 26. Buying bait from a licensed bait boat is permitted prior to beginning your day of competition. Competition officially begins for a boat once their fishing lines are put in the water.
- 27. All fish must be brought to the weigh station by the boat on which it was caught, under its own power.
- 28. Boats are to proceed in an orderly fashion to the weigh station. One member of the crew must remain with the fish to verify weigh-in and sign the weigh-slip. Boats will not be tied up in the designated off-loading area and crew must depart

- immediately after off-loading fish.
- 29. Junior Angler, Senior Angler and Lady Angler Rules and **Definitions:** The boat and no more than one (1) Junior, Lady or Senior Angler get credit for the fish weighed. Any Junior, Lady, and Senior Anglers must accompany the fish to the scales, print their name and sign the weigh slip to get credit.
- 30. A Junior Angler is determined by not having reached the age of 16 by the date of the Captain's Meeting on October 14, 2025. A Lady Angler is any female who has attained her 16th birthday by the date of the Captain's Meeting on October 14, 2025. A Senior Angler is any angler who has attained their 55th birthday by the date of the Captain's Meeting on October 14, 2025. An angler may only qualify for one category.
- 31. Minimum size limit of 30-inches for all King Mackerel entered in the Tournament and only one (1) King Mackerel allowed to be weighed-in per boat per day unless entered in specified TWT's allowing otherwise. If weighing two fish for a related TWT, the heaviest qualifies for Level 1.
- 32. *Once officially registered,* all entry fees are non-refundable.
- 33. Any Tournament Official or Tournament Sponsor entering the Tournament in compliance with the Tournament rules is eligible for any and all prizes.
- 34. All tournament participants consent and authorize the Tournament Committee and their advertising/public relations agencies to use and reproduce names, voices, and/or photographs – whether taken or recorded – and circulate the same for any, and all purposes of publicity and advertising of all kinds and description in any, and all media formats.
- 35. Any protests must be made in person to a tournament committee official by 6 PM on the final fishing day accompanied by a \$1,000 cash non-refundable protest fee.
- 36. *All participants must follow* local, state, and federal recreational fishing rules and regulations.
- 37. *The Tournament Rules Committee* shall determine the solution to questions, situations or protests, and its judgment SHALL BE FINAL.
- 38. The Tournament Rules Committee reserves the right to refuse entry to anyone.

NCLEAP:

Supporting North Carolina's First Responders

irst responders dedicate their lives to protecting our communities, often placing themselves in situations that most people can hardly imagine. From line-of-duty shootings to fatal accidents, natural disasters, and other critical incidents, the emotional weight of their service can be immense.

Recognizing this reality, the North Carolina Law Enforcement Assistance Program (NCLEAP) was established to provide specialized care and recovery resources for law enforcement officers, firefighters, EMS personnel, and their families.

Origins of NCLEAP

NCLEAP was co-founded by Aaron Back, a veteran law enforcement officer, and Chaplain Danny B. Leonard, who has decades of experience in pastoral support and critical incident response. Their vision was to create a unique program that combined peer support with chaplaincy care, ensuring that first responders would never have to navigate trauma alone.

Drawing on the highly regarded Post-Critical Incident Seminar (PCIS) model first introduced by the FBI in 1985, NCLEAP hosts multi-day seminars where participants learn about trauma, resilience, and practical strategies for recovery. These seminars are peer-driven, blending the experience of fellow responders with the guidance of trained facilitators, mental health professionals, and chaplains.

Mission and Services

The heart of NCLEAP's mission is to strengthen resilience in North Carolina's first responder community by offering: peer-to-peer support that connects



Proceeds fund scholarships for deserving graduates from Swansboro and Croatan high schools, as well as other community

When the doors open at the Rotary Civic Center in Swansboro Saturday evening, it will mark the 44th year that the club has cooked up a batch of oysters for appreciative ticket holders. And, while the tradition continues, times have certainly changed from those early days.

The Swansboro Rotary Club's Oyster Roast and Pig Out Saturday, March 15, 2025 from 5-8 pm, will attract about 1,500 people. That first roast, just over 100 attended, according to Barry Matthews, a charter member and past president of the club.

Chartered on April 4, 1978, Matthews said the club members began seeking some purpose for existence other than meeting once a week for lunch.

"We knew we had to start small, we had no money," said Matthews.

"So many fraternal, civic and professional organizations for men had failed in the Swansboro area."

The only way the club was going to succeed was to do something that mattered, according to Matthews.

It was Ben Licko, the first president, who suggested the Rotary club follow the lead of the successful local

American Business Women's Association chapters and offer scholarships to deserving Swansboro High School graduates.

The club members agreed, but now that it had a purpose, it needed money.

"We came up with the idea of having an oyster roast, it seemed like the easiest thing in the world to do to make about a thousand bucks," said Matthews.

Bud Davis, another charter member, agreed to allow the Rotary Club to hold the first oyster roast at his car lot, Davis Auto Sales.

"We printed 100 tickets (to sell) at \$10 each," said Matthews. "That was for all the oysters you could eat and all the beer you could drink."

All the tickets were pre-sold for the first event and additional money was collected at the gate as people brought other people to the oyster roast.

The ovster roast was so successful the Rotarians decided to make it an annual event. The second roast also took place at Davis Auto Sales, but because it grew in popularity it was moved just down Norris Road to the Moose Lodge the third year, according to Matthews.

Eventually, the club had to move the event to the Cedar Point Flea Mall, which was at the corner of Old Highway 58 and NC 24.

"It was a gigantic property compared to what we were used to," said Matthews.

Then, the event moved again to the Western Carteret Fire Department before it was finally moved, in 1997, to the current location with the completion of the Rotary Civic Center.

Over the years, special tables, cookers and oyster cleaning machines were built to accommodate the event. Of particular concern, especially to the newest Rotarians, are the oyster cleaning machines.

Tradition has it that rookie Rotarians, called "Boots," are responsible for cleaning the oysters the club serves. Part of a member's initiation, Matthews explained, is being in charge of the club's "nastiest and dirtiest job."

It is by no means the only job.

"The whole club participates," said Billy Farrington, former club president.

In fact, in addition to the Rotarians, there are about 75 volunteers and 30 members of the Swansboro High School Interact Club that show up to help.

In order to pull off the event, planning starts in January, according to Farrington, who also served as co-chairman of the roast.

But, because there have been so many oyster roasts, he said, "Everyone knows exactly what to do."

For the event that started small, at \$10 a ticket, the cost has increased to \$75 a ticket, but the roast has increased too. Over the years, entertainment has been added and the menu has expanded.

Machine Gun, a variety band, will return this year. About 200 bushels of oysters will be served along with fried flounder, clam chowder, barbecue, hot dogs, coleslaw, hushpuppies, soft drinks, coffee and beer.

Proceeds fund scholarships for deserving graduates from Swansboro and Croatan high schools as well as other community youth projects.


And, while the club sponsors other fundraisers, there is a special place in the club's heart for the oyster roast – one of its longest lasting projects.

"It goes without saying that Swansboro Rotary Club is proud of this event," Matthews said. "It is an event that exemplifies what this town is all about.

"It's been an excellent vehicle to fund things that have been necessary for this community."










2025 OYSTER ROAST





REELING IN **TRADITION**

In the crisp fall air along North Carolina's Crystal Coast, there's a sound that signals tradition: the hum of engines at daybreak as sportfishing boats head for open water, chasing the silver flash of a king mackerel. For nearly half a century, that sound has meant one thing in Swansboro – it's tournament time.



TOURNAMENT HISTORY

From Humble Start to Premier Event

The Swansboro Rotary King Mackerel Tournament began 45 years ago as a small local fishing competition, organized by a handful of dedicated Rotarians eager to blend fellowship, friendly competition, and community service. Back then, the prizes were modest, the boats fewer, and the weigh-in a simple affair on the docks.

The idea was simple but powerful: create an event that celebrates the area's fishing heritage, draws anglers from near and far, and channels the proceeds into projects that serve the greater good.

Over the decades, that seed grew into one of the Southeast's most anticipated fall fishing events - now known as the **Swansboro** Five-O King Mackerel Tournament in a nod to its milestone anniversaries and prize structure.

The Heart of the Tournament

While the lures and lines are front and center, the heartbeat of the tournament has always been service. Every dollar raised supports the Swansboro Rotary Club's local and international initiatives – from scholarships for local students and improvements to community facilities, to global projects providing clean water, medical care, and economic opportunities.

Year after year, the tournament has attracted not just competitive anglers chasing big payouts, but also families, young fishers, and seasoned captains looking for camaraderie and a chance to give back.

Growing Prestige and Prize Money

In its early years, the winning fish might have brought home a few hundred dollars. Today, the tournament's prize structure has grown to include tens of thousands in cash, Tournament -Within-A-Tournament (TWT) high-stakes levels, and specialty awards for junior, lady, and senior anglers.

Some boats travel hundreds of miles to compete for the top prize, and the event now boasts sponsorships from marine, outdoor, and local business partners.

A Community Festival on the Water


The tournament has evolved into more than just fishing – it's an autumn festival for Swansboro.

The Captains' Party kicks off the week with live music, food, and fellowship. During fishing days, spectators gather in downtown Swansboro to watch weigh-ins against the backdrop of the White Oak River. And the Awards Party is a celebration in itself, often featuring well-known regional bands and drawing crowds of locals and visitors alike.

Looking Ahead to 2025

The 2025 edition, set for October 14-18, will mark another chapter in this enduring story. Anglers will again test their skill in the Atlantic Ocean, competing for top honors and special category awards – all while knowing their entry fees support causes far beyond the marina.

From its humble beginnings to its current status as a premier king mackerel event on the East Coast, the Swansboro Five-O King Mackerel Tournament is proof that when community, competition, and service intersect, the result is something worth reeling in year after year.

In the early tournaments, smaller Kings were accepted and every fish which met the size limit could be weighed in for which the boat received a fish bowl ticket to win one or more prizes. At one time, the tournament had three days of fishing for Kings. In time, that was reduced to two days and eventually to a one day tournament.

As the years rolled by, it became apparent that the seemingly unlimited number of fish in the oceans was rapidly becoming depleted due to overfishing. While tournaments were not the major cause, they did have an impact.

A key person that had a lot to do with conservation was **Dale Ward** who worked for many years with NC Marine Fisheries Division. Because of his efforts and dedication, changes in tournaments have had an evolutionary effect.

The Swansboro Rotary Tournament is now a one day event with only one fish per boat accepted at the weigh station. The picture in this article shows Dale thoroughly checking a King Mackerel to be sure it qualifies for a prize and also that it is a healthy fish, suitable for consumption.

We think of Dale primarily for his contributions to the fishing industry but we should not forget the impact he had on youthful fishermen, always willing to teach them about conservation so that they can carry on the work that he started.

Alongside Dale in the picture is **Joe Beasley**, for many years the Principal of the Swansboro High School. Joe accurately weighed in each fish brought to the weigh

station. Joe spent many days over the years working alongside Dale at the weigh station. In addition to the contributions to fishing tournaments, Joe will long be remembered for his diligence to teaching. The impact he had on his students as a teacher and as a principal will long be remembered by all of them.

As we remember those fun times with Dale and Joe, we also remember the sadness that came with the passing of these fine men. Their contributions will long be remembered by the myriads that came in contact with them. Each of these men received the highest honor given by the Swansboro Rotary Fishing Tournament by dedicating a tournament to them.

There appears to be an increase in the number of King Mackerel in the oceans. If true, we can attribute that, in part, to the conservation efforts of men like Dale Ward and Joe Beasley. We can all benefit by their tireless efforts on conservation. More information on these men can be found in the following past tournament magazines: Dale Ward, 2004; Joe Beasley, 2007.

Memories are something we cherish as we age. The greater the impact of memories on our lives, the longer they will last. Dale and Joe will surely be in our memories for a long, long time. Many future generations will benefit by what these men did in their lifetimes.

They epitomize what memories are all about.





On an ice-cold day in February 1980, Captains Bob Koraly and Bill "Coker" McCain each anteed-up \$750, raised their mugs in a collective toast to three fellow boat captains who had recently, yet finally "crossed the bar," then pledged to memorialize them in some meaningful, celebratory way.

Local charterboat captains Bob Wright, Vincent Ward and Lesta Willis had all passed within weeks of each other and this frigid winter afternoon seemed the perfect time to hoist a few cold ones in their honor, exaggerate their exploits, plan a future celebration and engage a group of co-conspirators.

Wouldn't you know it - before the day was done, Capt. Joe Webb, Surfer Buzz Boe, Capt. Todd Christianson, Realtor Joe Kalkhurst, Capt. R.L. Williams, and Clam-man Richard Hambley were all firmly "on-board." Libations flowed way more freely and surprisingly, a reasonable plan emerged from the depths of chaos.

Memorial Day weekend would be the date and a three-day fishing tournament would be the event. The Swansboro King Mackerel Blue Water Memorial Day Fishing Tournament suddenly had life and a heck of a long name!

Call them crazy or genius, one thing is certain regarding these eight creators of their newlyformed tournament – they were absolutely fearless in the face of long odds.

The United States, you see, was mired in the midst of a severe recession, interest rates were north of 18% and then-President Jimmy Carter – in a now-famous television address - proclaimed Americans were suffering from a "malaise."

Gasoline was rationed, fuel prices soared and lines to pump a few gallons in your car grew long and contentious. Area businesses felt the sting of an especially harsh winter, store owners shortened hours of operation and inflation roared at double-digit levels.

Right in the middle of this mess, our "band of eight originators" figured this was a fine time to start a tournament!


The rest, as you can probably guess, is history. This little part of the universe was good and ready to bust out of this so-called malaise as Springtime (1980) approached. Our eight cohorts – known widely for playing hard – also worked hard as they rounded up sponsors, fishermen and a cadre of helpers and advisors.

Captains Hambley and McCain jumped on Coker's plane, flew to Raleigh and met with Dick Jones of WITN-TV. There, they filmed a 30minute promotional video with Jones in exchange for a shark charter on Rick Hambley's boat. While other facets of the local economy languished, the fishing tournament business shifted into high gear.

Thirty-five years have now passed and, sadly, four of the original cast (Boe, Christianson,

Kalkhurst and McCain) are no longer with us. Their departure does nothing to lessen the significance of their founding efforts of this tournament.

Amazingly, the passing of those 35 years has done little to diminish the memories (or the pride) shared by Captains Koraly, Webb, Williams and Hambley. Each of the four recently recounted those long-ago days as if they happened just last week.

JOE WEBB

Joe Webb's charterboat Billy Anna II has just turned 40, is on her third set of engines and rests comfortably in the same location where Otway Burns' Prometheus -one of the state's first steamboats - was built back in 1818.

Joe, 73, and I recently met at the helm of Billy Anna II where he immediately gave me a thorough history lesson on downtown Swansboro and its Front Street.

Convinced that I could pass any quiz on Harry Moore, sawmills, Buck Stone, Sam Jones' Barber Shop, etcetera, I pressed loe about the tournament's successes and longevity.

Without hesitation, the legendary captain observed, "Usually when something is started by the right people for the right reasons, it lasts a long time."

You gotta love Joe Webb - simple and profound, all in one fell swoop. It's no secret that "The Webber" knows how to have fun and he quickly made this assessment, "I'm sure glad the tournament has returned to downtown. That's fun! Now everybody, including the spectators, can enjoy all of it."

BOB KORALY

Vacationing this winter in Stuart,

Florida, Bob Koraly shared texts and phone calls as he expressed his obvious excitement regarding the tournament's 35 year history.

"After three great years, we knew the tournament was outgrowing us. That's when we met with you guys at the Old Seafarer's Restaurant and asked the Rotary Club to take over. It worked out great."

Fun, competition, entertainment, and tribute were all necessary components for the event's initial success according to Captain Bob. "For entertainment, we had the One Man Band. We never knew his name, but everybody loved him and danced 'til they fell down."

R.L. WILLIAMS

Amazingly, Capt. R.L. Williams recalls detail after detail of those early years. R.L. (with wife Diane) having recently returned home from visits to Scotland and Chile, seemed most impressed with the overall positive impact the tournament has produced.

"Nobody will ever be able to trace just how much good this tournament has done for this community!" Williams, 72, points out that as long as he owned a charterboat, he served as a "committee boat" exchanging vital information between the fishermen and the officials.

"We fished this event every year I had a boat, and one year I caught a white marlin the day before it started. That was bad timing, but that's what makes up fishing stories. I'm proud that I was a part of it!"

RICK HAMBLEY

Rick Hambley, now 66 and retired on the eastern shore of Virginia, gets all the credit for including the shark category in the early years. Glad to

hear his old rival, Oscar Schneider is alive and well, Hambley reminisced, "Oscar and I loved to battle each other catching sharks. Those sharks created a lot of excitement in the tournament."

Hambley, a true international Sea Captain who ran boats for both the Prime Minister of Thailand and the President of Turkey, seemed amazed that the tournament was still going strong. "Thirty-five years – are you kidding me?"

THE FOUNDING EIGHT

No kidding Rick. Thanks to the "eight imagineers" and a Rotary Club that needed a major fundraiser to solidify its existence, the Swansboro Rotary Memorial Day Fishing Tournament is set to go again, despite years of countless changes and a whole lot of tweaking.

Interestingly, those necessary ingredients for early success (mentioned earlier by Captain Bob) remain vital to our success today. Any close examination of the evolution of this great event will clearly reveal, perhaps more importantly than all else, the extraordinary vision possessed by the "founding eight."

It is for this reason (and many others) that the Swansboro Rotary Club dedicated the 2015 Tournament to Buzz Boe (in memorium); Todd Christianson (in memorium); Rick Hambley; Joe Kalkhurst (in memorium); Bob Koraly; Bill McCain (in memorium); Joe Webb; and R.L. Williams.

As we show our appreciation and recognize these "founding eight" on this Memorial Day, let us also remember and respectfully pay tribute to Captains Ward, Willis, Wright and especially, all Americans killed in active service.





CAUGHT OFF GUARD BY A MACKEREL!

Well, I did get out on the water for the Swansboro Rotary Memorial Day fishing tournament after all.

We were not sure if the crew of the 'Misty Sea' would make it with a motor that had anti-freeze leaking into the motor oil. After Paul Ineman and I pumped out the old oil and replaced it with all new oil, we headed out for Mile Hammocks Bay on Camp Lejeune Saturday morning. We got a late start after checking the oil and loading up the boat, but we did get in the water by 6:30 am.

After looking for live bait – with no luck - we headed out the New River Inlet and set a heading for Divers Rock about four miles off the shoreline of Onslow Beach, With Deanna, my wife of almost 24 years at the helm, Paul and I started setting out the lines.

We put outriggers in the water first and just when we started getting the flat lines ready to go out we had a king hit the outrigger on the port side of the boat. This really caught us off guard. That fish came

out of the water like a missile with the ballyhoo in its mouth, but not the hook.

It ran with the bait and jumped out of the water for the second time but this time it spit the bait out of it's mouth without getting hooked. Paul and Deanna said it

was a big king at about 25-30 pounds but I was not so sure about the size. It was a nice fish but like Paul told me, I can't see anyway.

That would have been nice to have in the icebox so early in the day, but it was not meant to be. We

stayed in the area and tried for another strike.

The weather was great and the seas were not too bad, but I get seasick in my bathtub. After about 30 minutes Deanna told me that I was looking a bit pale and I was not feeling too good. So I took two Dramamine – the 24-hour type – that worked for me last year.

The funny thing was that I had called my doctor two days before the fishing tournament and he gave me a prescription for the Transderm Scop patches that I always used during fishing tournaments in years past. I had put one on the night before. So I could not understand why I was getting seasick. Even after taking the two Dramamine I was still not feeling too well so I drank an ice cold beer and after 20 minutes Deanna said that I was a different person and I was feeling much better.

So the fishing continued with me setting out lines with new baits and some of my secret chum that I make for my chum dispenser that I made for the downrigger. But boy did I make a mess with it. It got all over the stern of the boat and all over me. That stuff is hard to get off of your hands, and boy did it smell. But the fish love it and that's all that counts.

The next strike that we got was on Paul's side of the boat and Deanna and I got to watch him land a shark that was foul hooked and was hard to bring to the boat. I told him to stop playing around with that shark so we can catch some kings. Boy was he tuckered out after that fight. It was coming to the boat sideways which is why it took Paul so long to get it to

We baited up the lines again and set them out, this time we headed down the shoreline to try our luck near the inlet, I steered the boat along the beach while Paul took a nap and Deanna and I talked about the other fishing tournaments that we had fished, one of which was this tournament back in 1991 on our 21-foot Grady White boat.

Deanna is a lot tougher that I am. She has never gotten seasick and can handle any job on the boat, and she loves to fish. Well, she loves to catch fish; sharks are her favorite. I have seen her land one right after another when we lived in Southport.

After a few hours of trolling along the beach we headed back to Divers Rock and when we got there we could see some Spanish mackerel jumping out of the water so we knew that the fish were still there. So at 3:15 pm Deanna steered us around the other 12 boats that were out there and after she ran the boat through a chum slick that was right over the reef we had a strike on one of the down riggers, and boy was that reel screaming. Paul grabbed the rod and I started pulling in the other lines to get them out of the way and did they get into a tangled mess. Paul was yelling for a glove and I was grabbing the gaff and by the time he got the fish to the boat he just pulled it over the side and into the boat.

Everything was happening so fast; it was like a fire drill and no one knowing what to do. After I got all the other lines that were in a mess into the boat I started cutting lines and wrapping them together. I asked Paul if we were done for the day and I then started putting the rods away so that we could get started making our way to the check-in to weigh the fish.

Before we did that I tried calling the phone numbers and the VHF channel that they gave us at the captains' meeting for information with no luck at all. I know that I called the phone numbers 12-15 times to see if a 10-pounder would place on the board. But I did not get any response from either phone number or the radio calls. The phone numbers just rang and rang with no answer.

Why did they give out a number to call if they were not going to monitor the phone and the same with the VHF channel? What if I would have had to call in an emergency to get permission to help another boat if they needed help? This needs to be fixed for next year. We did have some engine troubles out there. When we were going to head back in with our king, Paul pushed the throttle forward and we heard a metal-to-metal sound that was not good. We had been trolling at 1000 rpm all day with no trouble but now when we need to go fast all we could do was 1000 rpm. So we had to troll back in to the dock, and it took two hours and there was no way we could make it to the weigh-in.

I told Paul that any boat that gets you home after having engine trouble is worth its weight in gold. So it is not just a lucky boat but a tough old girl as well.

So another good story for my column; as I have said if everything would go as planned I would not have anything to write about. The crew of the 'Misty Sea' will be back on the water soon in search of those kings.

Looking back over the history of the Swansboro Rotary Club King Mackerel Blue Water Tournament, there are many memorable events. This article, written in 2007 touches on the origins of the tournament. In the beginning the two day tournament was held over the Memorial Day weekend – the KMT on Saturday and the Blue Water on Sunday. In 2010, the tournament split into two tournaments – The Swansboro Rotary Memorial Day Blue Water Tournament in May and the Swansboro Rotary King Mackerel Tournament in October – giving rise to the Swansboro Tournament Series. In 2013, the King Mackerel Tournament was renamed the Swansboro Five-O King Mackerel Tournament in an homage to the 1968 classic TV series – Hawaii Five-O – and to signify the tourney's field limit to only 50 boats. A lot of levels and changes have occurred over the years, but the purpose and the heart behind it never changed raising money to serve the community and promote good fellowship among its participants.

emember when, in 1984, the total purse was less than \$10,000 and there were less than 100 entries in the tournament?

Remember when, in 1988, the tournament prizes topped the \$100,000 mark? In that same year do you remember Lee Moore of WCTI-TV 12, one of the most experienced sportscasters in the broadcast business, as master of ceremonies? Remember in 1994, when the Rotarians changed the prize format to allow for an increased cash payout structure by nearly \$10,000? The list goes on and on, with all Rotarians, anglers, spectators and sponsors having special remembrances of their own.

The town of Swansboro itself has a long history, including its importance as a port city.

After the Civil War, commercial fishing became its sole industry. It is easy to understand why a town that has such deep historical roots with both its local waters and the species of fish within them, later becomes the host of a fishing tournament that reflects not only its surroundings, but also the depth and dedication of the community itself.

It was in 1978 when the Swansboro Rotary Club came into form. It began with 23 members, with Ben Licko as appointed president. From there, the club grew by leaps and bounds, reaching out to the community of Swansboro.

Not only did the number of members grow from year to year, but the amount of goals and projects to help better the community grew as well.

The Rotary's motto of "service above self" has always been reflected by the Rotarians through the activities in which they dedicated their time and effort.

In 1980, one of those projects began. The first annual Swansboro Rotary fishing tournament came


into existence. Memorial Day weekend had already been a time set aside to spend with family and friends. In time, it would be the weekend that combined holiday, sport fishing, family, friends, neighbors, community, and traveling visitors all into one grand event. Each year, the tournament stayed true to its original intent to provide an enjoyable weekend for its anglers, spectators, and sponsors.

In 1991, the *Swansboro Rotary* Club King Mackerel Blue Water **Tournament** became the first tournament on the newly established Southern Kingfish Association circuit. SKA President at that time. John Jones. acknowledged the Swansboro tournament as highly ranked, in comparison with other tournaments held along the southern Atlantic.

As the club's single largest

fundraising activity, the proceeds from the **Swansboro** Rotary Club King Mackerel Bluewater Tournament are dispersed throughout the community by way of scholarship funds, community funds, and fishing interest funds. The community pitches in to help the now more than seventy members of the Rotary with many of the projects, including the fishing tournament. They enlist the help of local residents, students, boy and girl scouts, and many others to help with the various needs of the tournament from cleaning fish to cleaning up.

Remembering the beginnings and growth of this tournament would not be complete without remembering the tournament dedications of years past. The tournament has always acknowledged its founders, supporters and contributors, and loyal Rotarians.

From memorial dedications of charter members such as Jim Bean, Claybron Gurley, Austin Guthrie as well as dedications to past president John H. Wood and loyal supporter Captain Charles E. "Chuck" Kay, each year's tournament focused on appreciation of someone or something important to the tournament. John Licko and Jim Morse Davis, Jr. have been honored for their special contributions.

Dale Ward and Al Barnes are certainly missed, but never forgotten for all of their time and commitment to the tournament through the years. Dedications and much deserved credit have been given to the faithful sponsors, conservationists, sport fishermen, military service men and women, Captain's Circle members, flood relief volunteers, and Hammock's Beach State Park.

As we begin another year of giving fishermen, spectators, and sponsors what they want, while also taking the tournament to the next level.


The focus remains on the memory of the founding members and their contributions along with the cooperation, participation, and support of the community and those within it who dedicate their time to this tournament's success.




Reflecting on this tournament, it is obvious to say, "You've come a long way, baby." Years down the road, many will look back to this year's tournament with the same thoughts of "remember when ..."

Chronology of the Swansboro King Mackerel **Tournament**

- 1978: The Swansboro Rotary Club is formed with 23 local businessmen. Ben Licko is the first president.
- 1980: First Swansboro King Mackerel Blue Water Tournament. Captains Bob Koroly, Bill "Coker" McCain, Joe Webb, R.L. Williams, and Todd Christianson, along with Surfer Buzz Boe, Realtor Joe Kalkhurst, and "Clam-man" Richard Hambley – also known as the "founding eight" - proposed the tournament to the newly formed Rotary Club as a major fundraising event.
- 1984: Total purse for both tournaments is less than \$10,000
- 1988: Total purse increases to \$100,000 for both tournaments
- 1991: Tournament becomes the first tournament on the newly established Southern Kingfish Association circuit
- **2010:** The **Swansboro Rotary Fishing Tournament Series** is born. The Bluewater Tournament continues to be fished over Memorial Day weekend and the Swansboro King Mackerel Tournament is moved to October. The purse (based on 200 boats) is set at \$25,000 for first place, and \$10,000 for second place.
- 2013: The King Mackerel Tournament is renamed the Swansboro Five-O King Mackerel Tournament with a major change in format. The tourney's field is limited to 50 boats, which are admitted on a first-come, first served basis. Those that get in are guaranteed a reserved spot for the following year's tournament. First place is a guaranteed \$30,000 with 6 TWTs to increase the chance of winning upwards of \$100,000.
- **2014: Closest Fish Prize** added to tournament.
- **2016: Level VII Winner Take All Mack Daddy TWT** worth \$42,500 is added to the tournament increasing the total purse to over \$130,000.
- **2018: Level I through Level VII** payouts are significantly increased. Top 3 payouts if all 50 boats enter all levels increases to \$118,188 for 1st place, \$31,038 for 2nd place, and \$21,025 for 3rd place.
- **2019:** Rotary Scholarship awards exceed the \$1,000,000 mark due to income generated in part through the Swansboro Rotary Club Fishing Series.
- **2020:** The Swansboro Rotary partners with **NCLEAP** by adding a Level VIII NCLEAP 50/50 Aggregate TWT for \$21,250 to the tournament. Fifty percent of all entry fees in that category are donated to NCLEAP.
- **2020:** A \$5000 Outta the Money Prize is added to the tournament that awards 5 random weighing teams - from 11th to last place -\$1000 each through a random drawing.
- **2021: Tournament record** for the heaviest king is set by Chip Sanders and team Hoo Hunter of Cape Carteret bringing in a record breaking 63.32-pound King Mackerel, taking home \$101,920.
- **2022: Level IX Elite 10 Aggregate Winner Take All** added. The Elite 10, a two-fish aggregate TWT is open to the first 10 teams to enter. Total purse is \$42,500, bringing the total possible payout to \$160,688 for 1st place, \$31,038 for 2nd place, and \$21,025 for 3rd place.
- **2024**: Tim Hudson and team White Lightning of Wake Forest won a tournament-record payout of \$144,452 with a 45.06-pound king
- **2025**: Tournament contributions to NCLEAP reaches \$337,500 with the most recent contribution of \$67,500 from the 2025 Memorial Day Bluewater Tournament.












King Mackerel Tournament moves to October

Fishing Tournament Series established

The second weekend of October has long been known as the weekend of the mullet in Swansboro.

Well, beginning this year the mullet will have to share some of the headlines on that particular weekend with a few other species of fish – specifically the king mackerel, speckled trout and even the lizard fish.

That's because after 30 years of fishing in late May, the Swansboro Rotary King Mackerel Blue Water Fishing Tournament is making a major change.

In an effort to stage the event in the peak of the inshore fishing season, the King Mackerel Tournament will be fished on Mullet Festival Saturday and the Bluewater Tournament will continue to be fished on Memorial Day Weekend.

And the name of the tourney will change, now being referred to as the **Swansboro Rotary Fishing Tournament** Series.

There's also been an addition to the king mackerel tourney, with the addition of a speckled trout and lizardfish tournament.

"We wanted to reach out to more fishermen," said tournament director David Nance. "In recent years the king mackerel winners have been in larger boats and are often members of a team.

"By introducing the inshore tournament for the speckled trout and lizardfish we're making an attempt to bring the community back into the event. With the implementation of the inshore tournament, we believe that anyone with a 16-foot boat can get out there and compete."

Swansboro Rotarian Barry Matthews is a former Southern Kingfish Association National Champion, and he's also a member of the tournament committee.

He explained that by moving the king tournament to the fall, the fishing should be better and easier.

"We've had some erosion on the king mackerel side of tournament for several years," he explained. "We were able to erase some of that erosion with our guaranteed purse for first and second place.

"But all of a sudden last year we only had about 130 king mackerel boats, and that was somewhat disappointing to the fishing tournament committee," he continued. "We looked at several things responsible for the decline in boats, and the unpredictable weather and king mackerel fishing that early in the season were two of the biggest reasons."

King mackerel fishing in our area is just beginning to take off in late May, and it peaks in the fall.

"King mackerel are not here in great numbers in late May like they were years ago," explained Matthews. "The kings are much more prevalent in the Onslow Bay

area in the fall, and the weather's generally nicer, as well. The tournament committee does everything it can for the enjoyment and safety of the king mackerel anglers who fish our tournament, and all of them we've spoken with like the idea of the fall tournament."

This year's tournament will not have a guaranteed purse, but based on a field of 200 boats, first place will be worth \$25,000, second \$10,000 and third \$6,000.

The number of boats fishing in the bluewater tournament might also climb, especially this year.

Since a yellowfin tuna hasn't been landed in the tournament in several years, the purse for the biggest yellowfin has risen to \$13,744. And that's before any boats have registered this year.

There's a chance that if enough boats sign up for the yellowfin tuna competition, the purse could be in the neighborhood of \$30,000.

"Because the purse for the yellowfin tuna could be around \$30,000, we expect to see some of the bigger king mackerel boats enter and try to win that category," said Nance. "They won't have to go so far offshore, so we think that opens it up for some of our local anglers."



Hopefully, anglers who planned to fish in the 33rd annual Swansboro Rotary Club's annual King Mackerel Tournament this year were able to register.

On April 5, 2013, registration opened for this unprecedented maximum 50 boat tournament and within four hours of registration opening, all 50 slots were filled.

The tournament – renamed the Swansboro Five-0 King Mackerel Tournament – features a major change in the format. The tourney's field will be limited to 50 boats, which will be admitted on a first-come, firstserved basis.

With a 50-boat entry, the payout for first place is \$30,000 – the largest cash payout for any king mackerel

tournament in the country, according to tourney director David Nance.

"What the new format does is reduce the number of boats competing and increase the payout to the fishermen – it's a win/win situation," he said.


"It surprised us by how well it was received. The tournament slots filled up within the first four hours," Nance

Those that got in this year will be guaranteed a reserved spot for entry in next year's tournament. With TWT's, Daily Prizes, and Mystery Weight Prizes, First Place can pay in excess of \$30,000. These captains have registered their boats into the largest prize King Mackerel Tournament in the United States.


Nance explained why the Rotary Club's tourney officials decided to make the change.

"The Southern Kingfish Association (SKA) decided not to sanction our tournament this year because of some rule changes we made last year. That gave us the opportunity to make some more changes and better the format of our tournament."

First place is guaranteed \$30,000, but there will also be nice paydays for other top anglers. Second place will be worth \$10,000, third \$6,000, fourth \$4,000, fifth \$2,000 and sixth through 10th \$1,000. There will also be a tournament-within-a-tournament and prizes for lady anglers, junior anglers and senior anglers.



In 1978, a dedicated group of businessmen in the Swansboro area, under the sponsorship by the Jacksonville Rotary Club, met to discuss the formation of a new Rotary Club. After several organizational meetings, the new club was formed with 23 members. Ben Licko was appointed president of the provisional club and after the new club was chartered, he stayed on as President for the following year. After 38 years, seven of the charter members were still active members in the Swansboro Rotary Club.

Over the ensuing years since 1978, many members have come and gone, but the net effect was a growth to the current level of over 60 members. Thanks to those that persevered in spite of many obstacles that face any new club, and to those who helped the club grow, the Swansboro Rotary Club is held in the highest esteem by over 40 clubs in the district. This honor only comes about from the dedication and time put forth by the members and from the generous support of the citizens in the surrounding communities.

Since the formation of the club in 1978, several members have passed away, but their contributions have not been forgotten. The current club members wish to show their respect for those who helped make this club what it is today by placing their names on this memorial page.
